first string outfielder his Freshman year and the following season. He was converted to a pitcher and performed there his Junior and Senior years. All four years he batted over .400 and as a pitcher he led the league in strikeouts. He graduated from

At the same time he was playing semi-pro baseball for his town team. He began outfielder duties for them in 1940 and, except for 1944 and '45 when he was in the services, has played with them since. His batting ability was responsible for keeping him off the mound so he has done most of his performing in the outfield. Bob's 6 year batting average is over .310 and last season he belted the ball at a .357 clip. By the way, the Attica town team has won the league championship every year for the past several.

There wasn't much ball playing for Bob in the armed services. An appendectomy and basic training kept him away from the game in '44 and in 1945 he pitched for the 314th Bombardment Wing at Guam. He won six and lost none to greatly aid his team in winning the championship of their league.

At Attica High, Mr. Flick also earned varsity letters on the soccer team where he was center halfback and on the basketball team where he was a forward. In 1942 he was team high scorer with 152 points in 15 games.
